

October was once one of my favorite months. Back when the fire trucks were minus air conditioning, all summer long I would profusely ask my Captain and my wife "is it October yet?" I always looked forward to October and when it finally came around my wife and Captain were relived as well. Well, all that changed for me personally on Saturday morning, October 13, 2001.

Prior to the above date, I was still in my personal nightmare dealing with the 343 FDNY Fire Fighters who died September 11, 2001, when the World Trade Center's Twin Towers were struck by commercial air liners flown by fanatical terrorist. And I do remember thinking several times, while dealing with the tragedy, that things could not get worse. Well, I was severely wrong.

October 13th was an A shift day for me at Fire Station 15. I arrived a little after 6 a.m. I was stunned when I walked into the back of the station, the entire B Shift was sitting in the TV room and several of them had HFD handheld radios - not a good sign. As I stepped in the door, I asked the first Fire Fighter that I had eye contact with, how many? He said probably one member down and one crew was still unaccounted for. I immediately had this terrible feeling that the Fire Fighter down was not only someone I knew but someone I knew well. Most of these "overwhelming" feelings I get ring true and this one was no exception.

The downed Fire Fighter was Jay Jahnke. I first met Jay when I was the chauffeur on the Engine at Station 28, the same shift that his dad, Claude, worked. Jay was 19, and even back then the young man gave me the impression that he was "biting at the bit" to follow in his Dad and his 3 Uncle's footsteps. One year later, 1981, Jay became a proud Member of the Houston Fire Department and it did not take me long to realize that Jay had an extreme passion for the fire service and this passion continued all throughout his career.

Jay's remarkable 21-year career ended as his crew battled a blaze at The Four Leaf Tower, a 41 story high-raise located at 5110 San Felipe (The West Tower). Ironically, this building was located next to an identical building and was built and considered "twins" as in "twin towers".

As most of you know, my main mission when it comes to our fallen Fire Fighters is *"Remember to Never Forget"*.

Who did Jay leave behind. A devoted wife, two great kids, a boy and a girl, ages 8 and 11, two sisters, a brother, and many nieces and nephews. His dad had 8 siblings and his mom had 2. His best and closest friend was Brad Stewart, who is a Fire Fighter as well. Jay had lots of friends - everyone liked Jay. Last but not least, his Fire Fighter family: 3500 Brothers and Sisters linked by one thing - dedication to protecting the citizens of the City of Houston, Texas.

Now, on to one of my favorite subjects - Jay's daughter Jayne. Jayne, who will turn 19 this October, is already off to college. All these years I have kept up with the family. I do identify with Jayne. In my childhood, I lost my mom to cancer a month before I turned 11. Jayne lost her dad a day before her 11th birthday. My dad died three years before. I woke up one morning shortly after my mother's death living with a family of five that I had never met before.

The difference is that Jayne and her younger brother had their mom who has stayed strong all these years and dealt with the pain and helped her children deal with the fact that on the morning of October 13, 2001, their dad did not come home. To finish this month's article, I am adding a picture of Jay along with the two other brave Fire Fighters who also died In The Line-Of-Duty during the month of October.


