



REMEMBERING OUR FALLEN FIRE FIGHTERS

From time-to-time, I like to give an update on all of my memorial projects. One of the things that I spend time on is researching for articles contained in this column. Producing an article every month for this column is not as easy as it might seem. I try to keep several articles ahead and I'm always looking for ideas.

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One of the main things that I had mentioned in the past January article is that I am pretty much the keeper of the memory of Houston's deceased Fire Fighters. I do this through two main sections of my web site. The first section is a list of the 60 Fire Fighters who died in the Line-of-Duty; the second section is a list of deceased past Fire Fighters. 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In 1986 I became involved in researching the names of Houston's Fire Fighters who had died in the line-of-duty since the beginning of the paid fire department, August 1895. The only place that contained original names were two memorial plaques located at fire department headquarters (410 Babgy) and the Houston Fire Museum. I began with those names and after 8 months of library time and countless interviews I was able to obtain information on 51 Line-of-Duty Fire Fighters. During the research process, I found a Fire Fighter named Harry Dodd (died 1923) who was not listed on the plaque. He brings the total to 52 Fire Fighters lost from 1895 to 1988. The information on these Fire Fighters were printed in the HFD's 1988 Sesquicentennial Year Book. Since that time, Houston has endured seven more Line-of-Duty deaths and information on one more lost line-of-duty Fire Fighter H. A. Harris (died 1921) was recovered bringing the total to 60 Fire Fighters. I still go back from time-to-time and do more research on these Fire Fighters so it is an on-going project.

I also keep track of the Fire Fighters retired or active who die during the calendar year. I keep a on-going list on the next page from this article that covers from January 1 to December 31 of each current year. The current year's deceased Fire Fighters are also listed on my website in the Houston Fire Department's Recent Deaths section. The names are added each January to the Memorial Wall at the Memorial Garden located on the grounds of our pension office. Each year during the Annual Fire Fighter Mass the names of the Fire Fighters who died since the last Mass are honored. 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Now, on to my favorite project, and that would be pictures. I figured out a long time ago that if I was going to document Houston's past Fire Fighters I would have to do more than supply information obtained from public records or newspapers from the library. This process begins with hopefully the original copy of a picture obtained from someone that either I find through research or they find me. Once the picture is in my presence, I scan the picture in a format that will allow me to repair it, improve on it or enlarge it. I also make an effort to identify the year and location it was taken and names, if possible, of the Fire Fighters in the picture. The picture now becomes my digital copy and the original is handed back to its

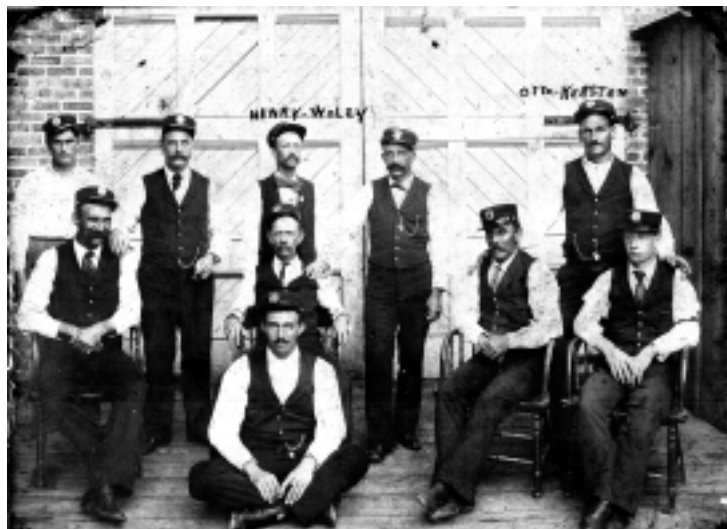
owner. Once I have the "digital" picture, my work begins. I use a program call Adobe Photoshop and for the past several years I have sat through about 40 hours of classes to be able to improve my photoshop skills. With these skills, I can take an old photo that is worse for the wear and make it good enough that the original owner can now frame it and display a picture of their "Fire Fighter Grandfather" in their home or office instead of the picture sitting in a box in the back closet.

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This past year has been really good for me as far as really great historical pictures. I was able to hunt down a rare panoramic picture that was taken in 1916 of the entire Houston Fire Department in front of Central Station located at San Jacinto and Texas. I am now making arrangements to have several copies framed for display in several fire department locations.

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The week before Christmas I visited a Fire Fighter's widow to look at pictures. When I got there she handed me a box that contained pictures of her Fire Fighter husband and son that had been sitting in a box at the top of her closet for the past 30 years. In this "pile" of pictures were two pictures's that her late husband, who worked at the old Central Station on Preston, found in a trash can in a chief's office. Needless to say, the pictures now about 111 years old survived the year's safely tucked away in the top of a closet. I will close this article by sharing these two pictures that will make a great contribution to Houston's pictorial history.
